Missionary Disciples of the Week

ST. KATHERINE DREXEL, VIRGIN

FEAST DAY: 3 MARCH. St. Katherine was born on 26 November 1858 in Philadelphia. Her mother died within weeks after her birth and so she and her sister were cared for by an aunt and uncle for two years. After which Katherine’s father remarried and happily called for his two daughters to live with him again. Another sister was born, and all five lived a happy, and faithful religious life throughout Katherine’s childhood.



Being raised as a charitable, kind and loving girl of faith, as Katherine grew older, she took an intense interest in the well-being of Black and Native American children helping to provide for their material and spiritual means. She began discerning a vocation to become a nun in her mid-twenties, but it wasn’t until she was 30 that she was invited to become one as a missionary by the Bishop who asked her to begin a new congregation for Black and Native American people. On 7 May 1889, Katherine entered the convent as



a postulant. Two years later after she pronounced her vows, she formed a new congregation called the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament. They used her former childhood home in Torresdale, Penn. as the location for the new order for two years until they moved

into their permanent location in Cornwell Heights. In 1894, she began the opening of the first mission in Santa Fe. Then through the Cincinnati Franciscan Friars a second mission and school was opened in northern Arizona. She worked with the Sisters of her Order to found many, many schools and homes for poor inner-city children all over the country. In 1937, she suffered a heart attack which limited her travels, and in 1955, at the age of 96, she died. She was canonized by Pope Saint John Paul in 2000.
