Missionary Disciples of the Week

ST. HYACINTHA MARISCOTTI, VIRGIN

FEAST DAY: 1 FEBRUARY St. Hyacintha was born Clarice Mariscotti in 1585 to a noble and wealthy family in Italy. She did not start off her life a particularly religious and charitable. In fact,

she was absolutely unkind to her younger sister and family when she was passed over for marriage in favor of her younger sister. She was forced to enter the convent. At first she did not take the religious life in a manner considered holy. It was not until she was named Sister Hyacintha. Her true conversion didn't begin until she was beset with a serious illness thanks to the grace of God. And from that point on, she undertook a deep devotion and piety that joyfully allowed her to endure many harsh disciplines, fasts, deprivations and much prayer for the rest of her life. Her holy example allowed her to be appointed, mistress of novices (a novice is the first stage of becoming a nun). She had a gift for being able to give guidance to novices in her charge. Many others wrote to seek her counsel because her advice was practical and full of common sense. Hyacintha was also known for her charity. Two confraternities whose purpose was to help the sick and aged were formed due to her influence. She died at the age of 55 on 30 January 1640. It was said that "through her apostolate of charity she won more souls to God than many preachers of her time."



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
