on, she undertook a deep devotion and piousness that joyfully allowed her to endure many harsh disciplines, fasts, deprivations and much prayer for the rest of her life. Her holy example allowed her to be appointed, mistress of novices (a novice is the first stage of becoming a nun). She had a gift for being able to give guidance to novices in her charge. Many others wrote to seek her counsel because her advice was practical and full of common sense. Hyacintha was also known for her charity. Two confraternities whose purpose was to help the sick and aged were formed due to her influence. She died at the age of 55 on 30 January 1640. It was said that "through her apostolate of charity she won more souls to God than many preachers of her time."
